LOCALLY IDENTIFYING COLOURING OF GRAPHS

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We introduce the notion of locally identifying colouring (lid-colouring for short) : a proper colouring of vertices is said to be identifying if for any pair of adjacent vertices u and v, the set of colours in the closed neighbourhood of u and v are distinct (when it is possible). The minimum number of colours needed for a graph G to have a lid-colouring is called the lid-chromatic number. We show that the lid-chromatic number of a graph G is at most $O(D^2)$ where D is the maximum degree of G. We also study the problem in some class of graphs, in particular in subclasses of chordal graphs and in planar graphs.
